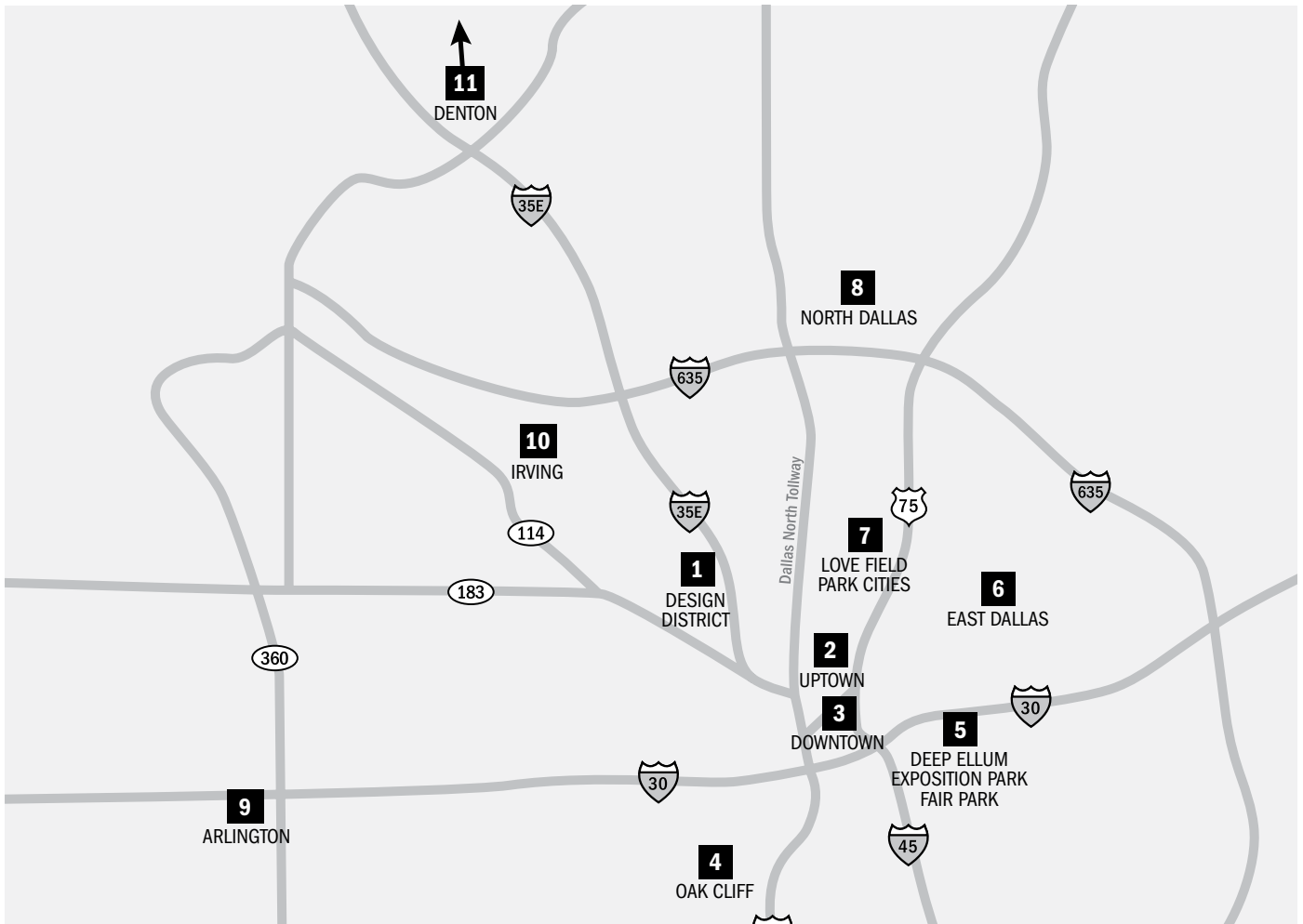
About the Edith Baker Art Scholarship and Artist Career Development Fund
